

College of Education Education Specialist Degree (Ed.S.) Curriculum and Instruction: Educating Diverse Populations Option

The Education Specialist Degree in Curriculum and Instruction is a thirty credit program designed to meet the needs of licensed, experienced practitioners who hold a master's degree in education from an accredited college or university or a master's degree in a closely related field of study, with a cumulative grade point average of not less than 3.0. Additionally, applicants must hold a valid teaching license in their state and be employed as a teacher of record in a public or private PreK-12 school setting with a minimum of three years of teaching experience.
